The long hair our men and women have is a way of better connecting ourselves with our grandmother earth so the longer we grow our hair the more connected we feel.

While making our regalia it takes time and patience and able to stay on one task at a time. When making our dresses, moccasins, and even

braiding someone's hair, you put love and good positive thoughts in it. So you and everybody else knows that you put pride into everything you make.

America is acknowledged as a country of equality.

The native see regalia as something to wear with honor. The same way people wear their cap and gown at graduation. The same way all of your politicians wear their suit and tie to be dressed respectively appropriate. The same way you politicians and legislators are represented and recognized by the donkey or elephant symbols.

Us young natives want to wear our regalia to be recognized and honored as the people we are.

If we can't wear our regalia, why should someone be able to wear Nike shoes, KC chiefs t-shirts, earring and high heels. The regalia is not a costume.

The federal government made a law known as the American religion freedom act. So by this act we should be able to wear our regalia for the act states basic civil liberties, and to protect and preserve for American Indians their inherent right of freedom to believe, express and exercise the traditional religious rights and cultural practice.
