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Executive Vice President Carolyn Gaughan, CAE Testimony: SB 69 – KanCare Process & Contract Requirements; Claims Appeals Senate Public Health and Welfare Committee January 31, 2017

Chairman Schmidt and members of the Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to present testimony on SB 69, on behalf of the Kansas Academy of Family Physicians (KAFP). Our organization represents over 1,660 active, resident, student and life members across the state. The mission of KAFP is to promote access to, and excellence in, health care for all Kansans through education and advocacy for family physicians and their patients. Quality health care and health outcomes for our patients guide our public policy work. As family physicians, we see people of all ages, both men and women, and we work with almost every type of ailment and illness that afflict our patients.

KAFP supports SB 69, KanCare process and contract requirements. As mentioned above, our mission is to provide quality health care for ALL Kansans. This is challenging in the current KanCare environment. This bill is designed to address a number of the issues raised by providers for several months, and most recently mentioned in the CMS letters regarding the waiver extension request.

This reform is much-needed from the provider point of view, as well as from a patient point of view. The bill outlines important system changes such as: a uniform process and forms for credentialing and re-credentialing healthcare providers; the process and limit for prior authorization for healthcare services and prescriptions; the process for internal claims grievances; the cap on administrative spending; and the appeal processes and timelines including independent third-party review. These are all critical provisions.
