Testimony regarding the impact of school partnerships with Boys & Girls Clubs for at risk students

Chairman Patton and members of the Committee. I want to thank you for the opportunity to provide written comment today regarding the profound impact that Boys & Girls Clubs has on our states youth, especially those youth who need us most. Boys & Girls Clubs in the state of Kansas provide 43 Club sites in 15 cities. 58% sites are school based Club sites, 18% are traditional Clubhouses, 11% are military and 7% on Native American sites. 39% of Clubs are located in urban areas, 32% in suburban and 13% in rural areas. BGC reaches nearly 18,000 youth, 69% who qualify for free and reduced lunch.

There has never been a more important time in our nation's history then now to support our youth. Currently, one in five young people not only lives in poverty, but is unlikely to graduate high school on time; and over 11 million young people are unsupervised after school – a time when juvenile crime escalates, exposure to risky behavior is heightened and escapes into the internet plagued with unrealistic expectations breaded by social media are at the fingertip of these youth. Our Clubs are open every day after school and when school is out to provide a safe environment with people that care and evidence based curriculum that closes this opportunity gap. According to our annual National Youth Outcomes, 97% of our teens reported that they expect to graduate from high school, with 74% of members 12-17 who attend the Club regularly saying the earn mostly A's and B's compared with 67% of youth nationally. Club teens are more likely to abstain from alcohol and marijuana than their national peers. A recent Harris Poll survey of Boys & Girls Club alumni found that more than half – 54%- say that participating in the Club actually saved their life

Boys & Girls Clubs fill the gap between school and home, providing safe environments where kids have fun, basic needs are met (134,509 meals provided and 646,138 snacks), participate in life-changing programs, and form supportive relationships with peers and caring adults. When \$1 is invested in Boys & Girls Clubs \$9.60 in economic benefits are returned to the individual and society. That is 13.8 billion annually. Boys & Girls Clubs help kids do better in school, strengthen families, teach kids life skills and build strong communities.

Schools are challenged by the many needs that students and their families experience. Together with the Boys & Girls Clubs, we can build stronger futures and increase the success of all students especially those students who need us most.

The Need

14% of young people in Kansas fail to graduate from high school on time.²

What We Do

We provide programs to help prepare our members for graduation. When Club members graduate, they have a plan in place whether that be college, career, or the military.

Our Impact

Among our teen-aged Club members, 93% expect to graduate from high school, and 72% expect to complete some kind of post-secondary education

The Need

33% of high-school youth in Kansas were involved in a physical fight in the past year.³

We provide opportunities for community service, mentoring, recognition, and leadership so Club members can become responsible citizens.

Our Impact

63% of Club teen members volunteer in their community at least once per year, while 41% volunteer in their community at least once per month.
