HOUSE BILL No. 2602

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AN ACT concerning school districts; relating to screenings for dyslexia and related disorders.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. (a) On or before July 1, 2019, the state board of education shall develop rules and regulations for the appropriate screening of students for dyslexia and related disorders. Such rules and regulations shall include, but are not limited to:

- (1) Implementation of appropriate screenings of students;
- (2) guidelines for conducting such screenings;
- (3) best practices for classroom support for students diagnosed with dyslexia or related disorders; and
- (4) such other rules and regulations as the state board deems necessary to implement the provisions of this section.
- (b) Beginning in school year 2019-2020, each school district shall conduct appropriate screenings of students for dyslexia and related disorders. Such screenings shall be conducted in accordance with guidance promulgated by the state board of education under subsection (a). In the event a screening indicates a student may have dyslexia or a related disorder, the school district shall notify the parent or legal guardian of such student. Such notice may include a recommendation that the student be evaluated by a licensed physician, psychologist or psychiatrist.
- (c) If a student has been diagnosed with dyslexia or a related disorder, the parent or legal guardian of such student may request an evaluation of such student for an individualized education program (IEP), 504 plan or other educational plan. Such request shall include a written statement from a licensed physician, psychologist or psychiatrist stating that the student has been diagnosed with dyslexia or a related disorder. Upon receipt of any such request, the school district shall conduct the appropriate evaluation for an IEP, 504 or other educational plan in accordance with federal and state law.
 - (d) For purposes of this section:
- (1) "Dyslexia" means a specific learning disability that is neurobiological in origin, and that is characterized by difficulties with accurate or fluent word recognition and by poor spelling and decoding abilities. The term "dyslexia" includes: (1) Those difficulties that typically

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result from a deficit in the phonological component of language that is often unexpected in relation to other cognitive abilities and the provision of effective classroom instruction; and (2) secondary consequences, such as problems in reading comprehension and reduced reading experience, that can impede growth of vocabulary and background knowledge.

- (2) "Related disorder" means a disorder similar to or related to dyslexia, such as developmental auditory imperception, dysphasia, specific developmental dyslexia, developmental dysgraphia and developmental spelling disability.
- Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute book.
