1. Walmart
2. Dollar General, Dollar Tree
3. Aldi
4. Predatory pricing and Below Cost selling of Milk
5. Amazon, Blue Apron, all other online food purveyors
6. Natural Evolution of business
7. 0% Food Sales Tax in Colorado and Nebraska
8. 1.45% Food Sales tax in Oklahoma
9. 4.25% Food Sales tax in Missouri
