RE: Senate Bill 317

My school administration career began in 1984. Except for a few years where I worked in a private industry, I have been a special education administrator since then. Special education has adapted to the changing demographics of Kansas children over the years. The one thing about special education that has not changed is the funding model.

Senate Bill 317 would significantly change special education funding. It would not reduce the funding that schools get, and it would create funding that could be counted on for budget building purposes.

Currently, special education providers submit the employees needed to provide special education and if licensed and approved, the funding is provided by Kansas State Department of Education (KSDE). An official (unaudited) total is used by KSDE to make the final payment to special education providers (Unified School Districts (USDs) and Interlocals. Because of this practice, KSDE is required to estimate the number of special education FTE units throughout the school year. Some years, USDs and Interlocals employ more than KSDEs estimate. This results in a lower than expected final payment and sometimes devastating news to.

Senate Bill 317 would eliminate the need for KSDE to estimate and dispurse funds based on the prior year's FTE. USDs and Interlocals could budget with a high degree of certainty what they would expect to receive in special education funding. No USD or Interlocal would loose revenue, rather they would receive their expected revenue the following year.

I should note that the Full Time Equivalent (FTE) in special education counts a full time teacher as 1.0 and a full-time paraeducator as .4.

Thank you for considering an end to the estimation of special education funds to USDs and Interlocals.

Senator Givens:

The purpose of this communication is to respectfully ask for your support to fully fund special education at 92% of the excess costs under K.S.A. 72-978. Recently, new estimates were released that reduced the expected cost of the school finance plan by about \$60 million over the FY20 and FY21 fiscal years (\$35 million in FY 20). We ask that you recommend and support a re-appropriation of these funds in the current budget to increase special education state categorical aid.

As a legislator, you may or may not be aware of the following facts regarding special education state categorical aid:

State Categorical Aid/FTE received during the 18/19 school year (\$30,085/FTE) was less than the amount originally promised by KSDE (\$30,610 /FTE).

State Categorical Aid/FTE budgeted for the 19/20 school year (\$29,800/FTE) was less the amount promised and/or received for the 18/19

school year (amounts noted in the first bullet).

When decreased funding for special education State Categorical Aid/FTE occurs, the diversion of funds from regular education programs occurs. Inequities are created across the state as special education entities are forced to negotiate with local districts for funding necessary to adequately provide services that children with exceptionalities need to be successful. Total local assessments for the six school districts in our cooperative had to be increased from \$2,295,509 in the 18.19 school year to \$3,399,488 in the 19.20 school year, an increase of \$1,103,979. This is an increase of 48% in local contributions.

At the November Kansas State Board of Education meeting, the Board made a recommendation to shift the savings noted in the first paragraph to special education state aid rather than move it back to the state general fund. As noted also in the first paragraph, state law specifies that special education is to be funded at 92% of excess costs. In Kansas, however, funding for special education has dropped in recent years and is actually at 75.3% according to KSDE. If the Kansas Legislature does not increase funding for special education, it is expected to drop below 70% by 2022. This also jeopardizes the State of Kansas meeting the Maintenance of Effort (MOE) federal statutory requirements under the Individuals with Disabilities Act (IDEA, Sec 300.203).

The failure to fund special education adequately compounds hardships as noted in the following examples. Additional special education staff cannot be added when needed because insufficient funding exists to provide those positions. Also, special education cooperatives and interlocals cannot compete in the employment of highly qualified staff with the local districts they serve because they are unable to offer competitive salaries and benefits to special education teachers. Even when special education entities have the funds needed to pay staff adequately, it is still very difficult to hire and retain quality special education licensed personnel. These hardships have a direct impact on the quality of educational services children with exceptionalities receive.

In order for special education funding to return to 92% of excess costs, KSDE's fiscal team calculated that the Kansas legislature must increase funding by approximately \$110.5 million. This means that any increased funding available due to a reduction in the expected cost of the school finance plan over the next several years will still fall short by nearly \$50.5 million. Given such a significant amount to attain 92% of excess costs, it makes sense to devise a plan this legislative session to increase special education funding over the course of the next several years.

School districts must provide services for exceptional students. This is not an option. Services are mandated by federal and/or state law. As public schools continue to receive more and more students with increased levels and varieties of physical, cognitive, behavioral, and neurological disabilities, the costs of special education will continue to increase. Decreased funding at the state level does not reduce or control the cost of special education. It simply shifts the burden of funding to the local level, where districts spend money intended for regular education students on students with disabilities. We hope these facts are helpful to you as consider issues dealing with education finance during the present legislative session. 


