Chair Senator Thompson and members of the committee,

SB478 is definitely an excellent bill; as it is necessary to bring relief for the citizens that have to view the continually flashing red lights from nearly 4,000 turbines across the state.

In Southeast Kansas from a location in Labette County near where I live what you see in the daylight will dramatically change when the sun goes down. The sky is then lit by one great long line of flashing red lights that seem to run for miles, and they blink as if in unison continually every few seconds, every day, from dusk till dawn. That's because from this view you are literally seeing many of the 139, and 26 alternate turbines navigational lights blinking from Neosho Ridge Wind turbines located in Neosho County, Kansas.

What is concerning is this view is nearly an entire county away from the Apex's Neosho Ridge Wind Development. What the Neosho County Commissioners allowed when they okayed the Apex's wind development and did not require a radar-activated lighting system for that project they made a decision that not only affected their county but one that resulted in effecting those living in surrounding counties around them.

To our west these lights can be seen miles across Montgomery County, and into Allen Counties, to our south clear to the Oklahoma line, across Labette County to our east, into Cherokee County.

From different areas, one sees different views, take for instance on 169 highway near Thayer, Kansas because the Neosho County project itself has numerous turbines, some close to the highway it is a little creepy driving during the day, but after sundown, it is distracting with the lighting on the turbines flashing with different patterns of each turbine that has 2 lights, some flash quickly, others a bit slower, some appear synchronized, others appear random.

This adds to a hypnotic effect when driving at night or the loss of tranquility when trying to enjoy outside on one's own property!

Apex chose not to use radar-activated lighting when developing the **Neosho Ridge**Wind turbines in **Neosho County**, Kansas they made an excuse of the cost, and from previous testimony before the committee, it was disclosed to you that the amount was minimal in comparison to the cost of that development.

What price do you put on doing what is best for area residents, and being a good neighbor? These lights are disturbing the neighboring residents of many counties; anyone living within miles of the turbines that are forced to view them is subject to the loss of tranquility from the constant blinking red lights as they negatively impact the beauty of our rural areas of the state.

Their lights are causing a distraction for those driving down certain sections of highways read the facebook posts below.

Currently, the Neosho development is not willing to place radar-activated lighting on their turbines and it will more than likely take a state law to force them to do so.

What is excellent about SB 478 is the Radar Activated Lighting system will continue to protect the aircraft and at the same time alleviate much of the annoyances that certain citizens are forced to view every day, from dusk till dawn. It is excellent as it will keep the situation that we are in currently from happening in future projects.




