

## **Homeland Security Funding**

The Kansas Highway Patrol Homeland Security Office (HSO) has served as the Governor-appointed State Administrative Agency (SAA) for the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) since 2001 and the Non-Profit Security Grant Program (NSGP) since 2018. The State of Kansas is divided into seven Homeland Security Regions with each represented by a governing council made up of local volunteers from various disciplines. As the SAA, the Patrol is responsible for pass-through and oversight of the HSGP and NSGP.

In fiscal year 2020, the HSGP received nearly \$4.1M in DHS appropriated funds. The monetary award is distributed among five sub-recipients to be allocated across the state to implement investments that build, sustain, and deliver core capabilities through planning, equipment, training, and exercise activities.

Calendar year 2020 was a difficult year with not being able to provide in-person training and exercise activities. Most trainings were canceled or offered virtually when possible.

Fiscal year 2020 funding was used to secure and sustain several state projects such as an existing Patrol Fusion Center Analyst to work in the Kansas Intelligence Fusion Center (KFIC). The Intelligence Analyst assists with analysis and dissemination of intelligence information to law enforcement in Kansas and beyond. Additionally, fiscal year 2020 funding was secured to sustain radiation detection and identification equipment to assist state partners in detecting, locating, measuring, and identifying radiological sources when needed.



# Joint Committee on Kansas Security

The State of Kansas' designated State Administrative Agency (SAA) for all Homeland Security Grant Program funding; is the Kansas Highway Patrol (KHP).

Homeland Security/Emergency Operations is the entity within the KHP responsible for pass-through and oversight of the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) and Nonprofit Security Grant Program (NSGP) for funding of preparedness and security enhancements to help *Prepare, Prevent, Respond, Mitigate and Recover* from acts of terrorism or other catastrophic events.

The HSGP and NSGP provide funding to close preparedness gaps through Planning, Organization, Equipment, Training and Exercise.

The Patrol oversees Project Development activities across the state which begin at the local level and include a vetting process before review by a Senior Advisory Council (SAC).

The timeline of activities begin a year in advance of funding, to prioritize our greatest preparedness gaps, eliminate duplication, foster a whole community approach, and fund activities that meet several state and federal requirements.

# The Process behind the funding

The timeline of activities begin at the local level with project development, putting together projects based on preparedness gaps identified in the THIRA/SPR.

## January-June

SPR (Stakeholder Preparedness Review) Activities- coordinate with SAA if facilitation needed

Project Development- must be tied to SPR

## July-October

Council Chair or designee submits council approved project workbook to Advisory/Group for vetting NLT September 1<sup>st</sup>

Advisory/Group respond back to **Regional Chair and** project manager NLT *October 1<sup>st</sup>*

Regional Chair or designee submits council approved project workbooks with the completed Training Pre-Authorization form and Vetting form to the SAA NLT *October 31<sup>st</sup>*

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# How gaps are identified for project development

## SPR Process

Communities use the THIRA (Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment) to assess their risk and set capability targets that reflect their preparedness goals.

Communities then use the SPR to answer the following questions:

- What are our current capabilities?
- What gaps exist between our targets and the capabilities we currently have?
- How can we address our capability gaps and sustain our current capabilities?

Communities identify gaps in five different areas: Planning, Organization, Equipment, Training, and Exercises (POETE). They also indicate whether achieving each of their capability targets is a high, medium, or low priority. Communities also rate their degree of confidence in their estimates of their current capabilities using a five-point scale, with a five indicating higher confidence.

Communities can use the THIRA/SPR process to better understand how to address their most challenging risks and achieve specific preparedness goals. They can use the results to support a variety of preparedness activities, including planning, training, and exercises. The THIRA/SPR also makes it easier for communities to direct resources where they will be most effective.

From this information, projects are developed to address the gaps identified in the THIRA/SPR.

# Development to Pre-Approval of Funding Proposals

Once the SAC determines what project proposals are supportable the state is ready for the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) to be released with grant guidance and allocations are adjusted for submission.

The SAA roles up approximately 60-80 projects into one Investment Justification (IJ) and we apply for the funding opportunity as the Recipient.

After award, the SAA is responsible for oversight, program management, communication with our subrecipients, project managers, fiscal agents, state and federal partners.

We pass-through the funds to our subrecipients, drawing down funds as costs are incurred.

Currently the unit is managing eight open programs which bring \$25,515,102 in resources to the state.

# Funding Requirements

**The HSGP is an 80%/20% split with additional minimum spend requirements which include:**

## **National Priorities- *defined by FEMA/DHS***

- Enhancing cybersecurity – **7.5 percent**
- Enhancing the protection of soft targets/crowded places – **5 percent**
- Enhancing information and intelligence sharing and analysis, and cooperation with federal agencies, including DHS – **5 percent**
- Combating domestic violent extremism – **7.5 percent**
- Addressing emergent threats (e.g., transnational criminal organizations, unmanned aircraft systems [UASs], weapons of mass destruction [WMD], etc.) – **5 percent**

## **Kansas Priorities- *defined by The Kansas Adjutant General\* (Signing Authority):***

- 1. Cybersecurity- **SA target= 25%**
- 2. Enhancing the Protection of Soft Targets/Crowded Places
- 3. Enhancing Information and Intelligence Sharing and Cooperation
- 4. Addressing Emergent Threats
- 5. Deployable Resources

**25% of overall funding must support Law Enforcement Activities defined in the National Framework.**

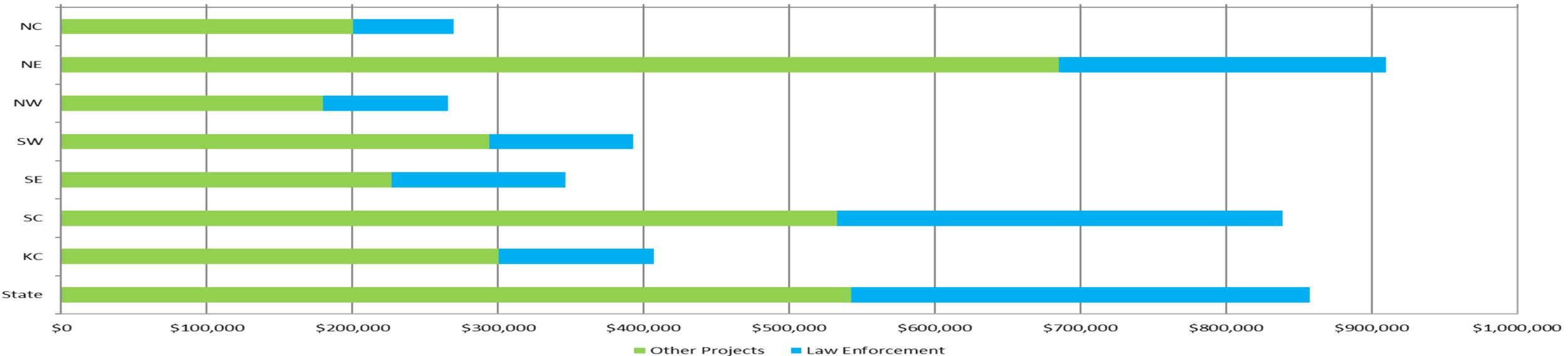

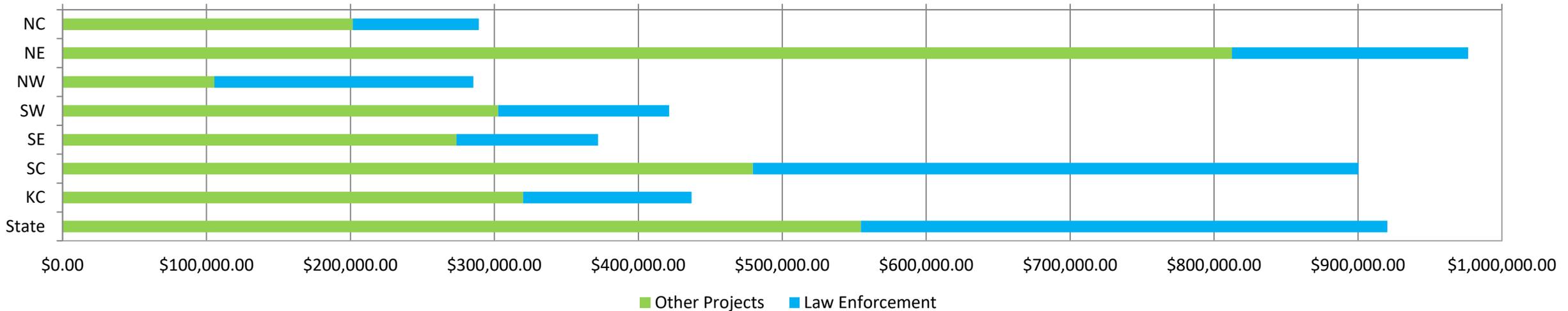
