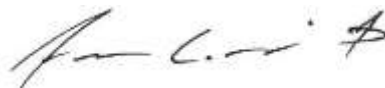
SUBJECT: Fiscal Note for HB 2030 by Joint Committee on Corrections and Juvenile Justice Oversight

In accordance with KSA 75-3715a, the following fiscal note concerning HB 2030 is respectfully submitted to your committee.

Under current law, the Secretary of Corrections, upon the approval of the Prisoner Review Board, may release an inmate residing in a Kansas correctional facility if a doctor licensed to practice medicine and surgery in Kansas determines that the person has a medical condition that is likely to cause death within 30 days. If the person does not die within 30 days, the released inmate is subject to revocation. HB 2030 would increase the number of days a doctor must deem an inmate likely to die or be subject to revocation to 120 days.

Based upon a review of medical cases of inmates currently incarcerated, the Department of Corrections estimates that approximately ten people per year could be eligible for consideration for terminal medical release if the period was extended to 120 days. For comparison, from FY 2016 to FY 2020 the Department received approximately one application per year under the 30-day period. The Department indicates it could absorb any increases in workload within existing resources. Any fiscal effect associated with HB 2030 is not reflected in *The FY 2022 Governor's Budget Report*.
