SB 47, as read, is tantamount to **public health in reverse.** Peer-reviewed scientific disciplines (Particle & Fibre Toxicoogy) and others continue to amass compelling evidence relating to **pathologies** associated with ingestion, adsorption, and inhalation of PET, PE, PVC, PP, PS, PUR-plastics in the workplace, human environment, as well as land & aquatic habitats.

SB 47, as read, **fails to consider differences** in pathologies from **one population to the next.** Epidemiological records in certain communities may vary in the amount of exposure to harmful plastics & polymers. For example, consumption of fish can be greater in some communities thereby leading one population to aquire higher burdens of toxic microplastics than others. Fine particles in drinking water may be greater in some communities compared to its cohort neighbors' bioaccumulation.

Illnesses such as local inflamation, oxidative stress, metabolic disruption, gastro-intestinal toxicology, hepatic dysfunction, reproduction disorders, and neurotoxic effects may emerge more predominate in certain localities due to increased exposure to plastic micro-particles.

Detectable levels of microplastics now is now found in **mother's milk** and **placenta** employing FTIR (Fourier-Transformed Infrared Spectroscopy). Human ingestion is now estimated to be greater than 50,000 particles per year (bottled water). Deposition in gut, liver, and testes is found to be 0.06 mg/Kg/day via drinking water.

High-risk communities must be allowed discretion to limit, reduce, or ban harmful materials as per Chapter 65-article 6, 34,-Public Health Statute for the State of Kansas.
