









I am a 70 year-old retired public accountant. Except for college years I am a lifelong resident of Iola, Kansas. I have served as a past president of Iola Area Chamber of Commerce and six years as a Trustee of the Allen County Regional Hospital. I am a Charter Member of the volunteers who constructed the 6.5 mile Southwind Railtrail in the year beginning in 2012, have maintained it since, and for the past 4 years have been serving as the Trail Manager of the Southwind Railtrail. I point out the Southwind Railtrail is adjacent to, and with a connector trail, connected to the Lehigh Portland Trail system. I became a cycling enthusiast in 2007 and since 2008 have ridden the Prairie Spirit Railtrail from Iola to Ottawa 26 times. In 2013 I experienced a serious heart attack. There is very little question my previous cycling activity provided secondary heart muscle strength sufficient to save my life. I believe in the importance of exercise and recreation.

During these past ten years I have spent hundreds of hours each year side trimming, mowing, and maintaining the Southwind Railtrail. During those hours I witness the large number of our local population who utilize that trail along with the Lehigh Portland offerings. Also observed are individuals from our metropolitan areas, and out of state visitors, who utilize these in conjunction with travel on the Prairie Spirit Trail. The connection to the Lehigh Portland backbone trail and single-track, along with the quarry/lake offers diversity to walkers, nature enthusiasts, and cyclists. I have observed firsthand the local trails have been one factor in the decision of young families to take up residence in our area. It has also been a factor in retired persons moving back to this area.

It is with my heartfelt request that the entire legislature take up the initiative to accept and give state park designation to the Lehigh Portland property. Doing so will deservedly return to local residents environmental resources for their tax dollars given to Kansas Wildlife and Parks. I, Scott Kroenke, am writing to express my support for HB2331, creating Lehigh Portland State Park. I am a native of the Iola area and have had the privilege to serve in the Kansas National Guard from 1997 through 2004, then transferred to Active Duty, which I am still serving. I will retire this summer after spending 26 years serving this great state and nation and returning to the Iola area. I have had the privilege to move to new locations, allowing me to enjoy many National and State Parks.

Allen County currently has approximately 962 veterans, per the Veteran Population Projection Model 2020 (VetPop2020)¹; lola has 28 full-time firefighters and officers²; these numbers do not include the Iola Police Department, Allen County Sheriffs Department, police officers, and firefighters from Humboldt, Gas, La Harpe, or the countless volunteers throughout the county or those that are no longer serving but are still residing in Allen County. Many of these veterans and first responders have lived through, seen, and experienced situations, myself included, that the citizens of Allen County will never experience. I was stationed in Fort Gordon, GA, and had the privilege to participate in a program that provided veterans and first responders with outdoor recreational wellness experiences. The primary modality was kayak fishing which has proven cognitive and emotional benefits. Additionally, these programs incorporated structured activities in a pressure-free environment, creating opportunities for community building and personal healing and providing much-needed camaraderie and support.

The creation of Lehigh Portland State Park will allow my fellow veterans and first responders a centralized location with Allen County where we can come together and provide much-needed camaraderie and support to each other. Iola is the only town that does not have a public lake near the population center of the respective county compared to Neosho, Bourbon, and Anderson counties. My vision is to provide outdoor recreational wellness within the Iola area. I have personally experienced the benefits that outdoor recreational wellness offers. The Lehigh Portland State Park is the perfect location, with the lake providing kayak fishing trips and hiking trails for a more personal approach. I have spoken to many community members and expressed

I John Leahy, am writing to express my support for HB2331, creating Lehigh Portland State Park.

I have had the privilege of being the steward of the Lehigh Portland trails for the past year and a half, as well as the Director of Trails for Thrive Allen County. One of the most important parts of my job is to tell the story of how Lehigh Portland came to be, and where it has yet to go.

That said, I should give you a tiny bit of my background. I'm a transplant to Kansas. My fiancé and I moved from Minnesota in 2018 to be closer to family, fulfill her lifelong dream of being a teacher, and reconnect with a slower pace of life away from the Twin Cities. There was some trepidation on behalf of my friends and family because they didn't understand why I'd move to rural Kansas, but all I could see was opportunity. Willa Cather is often attributed a quote that says, "anybody can love the mountains, but it takes a soul to love the prairie," and I can't think of a better Kansas-focused analogy. I saw the opportunity to, through hard work, help nature reclaim its place in my own life, and others I care about. Ad astra per aspera. My work with both the land and people of this area has taught me Lehigh Portland is the best opportunity here to connect folks with nature. Lehigh truly has something for everyone.

One particularly unique facet of Lehigh Portland is that it is a living museum. It is as rich in history as it is in its landscape. It is the beating heart of Iola and has been for more than a century. One of the first mentions of the area is described in Zebulon Pike's journal from 1806, when the indigenous tribes of the area met the party and Pike's men hunted deer near Elm Creek. A century later the first miners would start quarrying for the newly established Iola Portland Cement Company. Quickly the area would be enveloped with the homesteads of the factory workers. In 1917 Lehigh Portland Cement Company bought the Iola plant and would continue to be Allen County's largest employer until the plant's closure in 1971. Pieces of the industrial past can be seen in the ever-present cement silos, old cars peeking in the woods, abandoned railbeds now used for parts of the trails, foundations of long-lost homesteads, meticulously stacked stone walls, a water pumping station, and old access roads marked by brown Neosho River gravel. Newspaper articles can be found on the history of the cave on the eastern side of the property that describe a popular picnic spot, and potential hideout for bootleggers during prohibition. These visual markers live in locals' minds, and they have stories generations old to share if one listens.

In the years following the cement quarry closure, nature started to reclaim the land. The quarry slowly filled with water, the rocky soil left by mining was once again covered by native grasses, and wildlife began to appear again. That's when a vison of incorporating more organic and intentional ways of interacting with nature on the land started. This manifested in trails being carefully constructed following the contours of the aforementioned history. This process is easily seen when traversing the property but what might not be as readily apparent is all the work that's gone into fostering the wonderfully diverse ecosystems in close proximity to each other. Lehigh is a tapestry of ecosystems. Along the northern edge of the property cottonwoods and sycamores line the Elm Creek riparian area, with stalwart oaks foresting the uplands. Moving eastward one will pass through the pleasantly shaded savannah grasses, then into the rugged and colorful limestone glades, remnants of unplowed prairie that likely used to house livestock. Arid outcroppings overlook the quarry lake, and the alien features of prickly pears and yucca stand out in contrast to the lush green present on the western shore of the lake. Moving southeasterly, trees become scarcer and open to the widest swaths of prairie, which with care can be restored and in Pike's words, "produce a very beautiful appearance." All these areas have been carefully curated and fought for by a different breed of volunteer: the conservationist.

It's with these volunteers that I've found my passion. Balancing the ecology of the land with carefully maintained human infrastructure became woven into the fiber of my being. I became aware of Aldo Leopold's concept of land ethic, the idea that people and land are inherently intertwined, in my college years, and it fundamentally changed me. However, it wasn't until generous volunteers passed their knowledge on how to balance diversity in the context of Lehigh's ecosystems that I truly understood it. I have spent hundreds of hours managing invasive species, collecting seeds for native wildflowers, thinning overgrown forest, executing prescribed burns, and working to feather ecosystem edges; but that's only a drop in the bucket compared to the thousands of hours volunteers have put into the sustainability of Lehigh. Working beside them to ensure the longevity of both the land and the trails is among the most rewarding work I have ever done. In fact, the gift of the voluntary exchange of knowledge passed on by community volunteers is perhaps the most valuable gift that this community has to offer. Not to mention we're working to preserve one of the fastest disappearing ecosystems in the entire world: the great American prairie. Passing on the knowledge and story of this land is key to its survival, just much as maintenance and preservation. With the folks who care for Lehigh, educating the next generation of stewards is not just about passing on knowledge, it's about giving them the tools to build upon the existing legacy and chart their own course moving forward.

The Kansas legislature has the opportunity with this bill to continue the tradition already ingrained at Lehigh Portland and cement a sustainable legacy for future generations of Kansans. If my mentors in this work have taught me anything about the work it takes to care for the land, it is that paying attention is how we show love, and that sentiment doesn't just relate to the land; it's about the relationships we build together. Lehigh Portland can be the cornerstone for future generations of those willing to connect with nature and each other.

I will forever be comforted by memories of crackling grass fires creeping into russet fields, huge flocks of waterfowl seeking refuge in hidden coves along the lake's cliffs, the serene coolness of a light misting underneath a gray sky, crisp walks following a coyote's tracks in a fresh snow, light dancing on the back of an ornate box turtle sunning itself on the trail, a doe and her fawns silently resting in a newly cleared meadow, discovering an explosion of electric purple blazing stars flowers protruding from a rocky glade for the first time, and an owl waiting high in a cherry tree for dusk to settle in. I relish the work that lets me linger on these small moments, and it sustains me when times are hard. I found exactly what I was looking for when I came to Kansas: a way to connect with nature. I have Lehigh to thank for that.

Lehigh Portland healed me, and the people I've met because of this beautiful stretch of land in rural Kansas have healed me. Lehigh Portland is the place that taught me there is always more to see if you look closer. Lehigh Portland helped me realize what I can say now with pride: I'm a Kansan.

My name is Susan Lynn and I am writing in support of HB 2331, creating Lehigh Portland State Park.

I grew up across the creek from the old Lehigh Cement Plant. Back in the 1960s, Lehigh was a noisy, bustling industry that captivated our imaginations. Loud explosions shook the ground as the limestone was blasted from the cavernous rock quarry. The plant's rail cars lumbered through the woods at all hours of the day and night.

The only downside we could see was that every summer my mother had us use muriatic acid and razor blades to scrape away the cement dust that had accumulated on the windows of our house. Of course, I made no connection that we were also breathing that same air.

After the plant closed in 1970, the site became a graveyard of abandoned equipment that over time was buried by the encroaching woods.

Where we once dared to venture became downright uninviting.

Two things changed the scenario:

- 1. The quarry began to fill with crystal clear water from underground springs and became a popular site for Elks Club members who rented the lake for \$1 a year from Iola Industries, and
- 2. Volunteers began to build walking and biking trails around the lake, turning the woolly woods into a wonderland. Today, couples, friends, and families; high school and community college athletes, biking, and hiking groups flock to the trails that only 10 years didn't exist. I can now do more outdoor activities with my grandchildren than was available to me as a child.

Young families expect, and deserve, amenities that improve their quality of life. That's often where small towns like Iola fall short. Forty years ago, Iola's population was 7,000. Today, it's 5,300.

By further developing the Lehigh Portland trails and the accompanying lake, Allen County's towns would have a better chance for a sustainable future by attracting people our way.

We know it can work by evidence of the trails' popularity among people from across a three-state region, usually avid bicyclists eager to experience new trails. It's not unusual to see cars from across a wide region parked at the trailheads.

In my mind, the most persuasive argument for making this site a state park is that it would preserve the pristine waters and the magnificent trails for generations to come. This is a precious resource that must be guarded as well as celebrated.

Missourians, even though we are close neighbors, tend to think of Kansas as one big flat boring field.

LeHigh Portland proves that wrong. It is never going to be Mark Twain National Forest, but it is a jewel of its own. The beautiful lake, the single-track trails for mountain biking, the prairie and woodland habitats, and John Brown's Cave, not to mention the connection to the Southwind and Prairie Spirit Rail Trails make for an excellent and unique attraction.

LeHigh Portland State Park could be a beating heart pumping new tourism dollars into the state and lifting Southeast Kansas out of poverty--a desirable outcome for the rest of the state who will benefit from their higher tax revenues and their decreased dependence on public services. Also, if people come to see LeHigh Portland, they may get curious about the rest of the state and we can build more bike trails to connect all our state parks and recreation sites.

Even a Missourian can appreciate the beauty of Kansas when looking at a place like LeHigh Portland. In the name of state rivalry, if nothing else, please support HB 2331.
