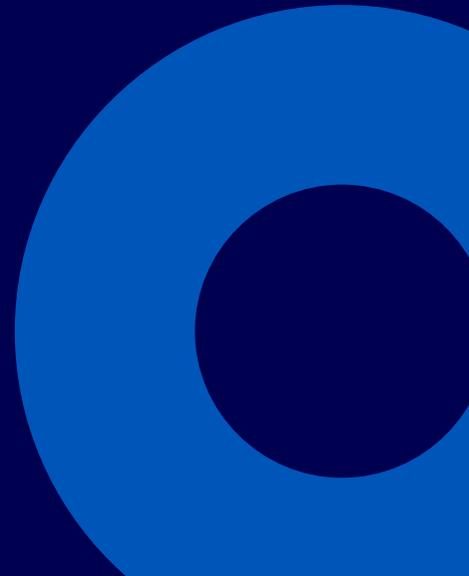




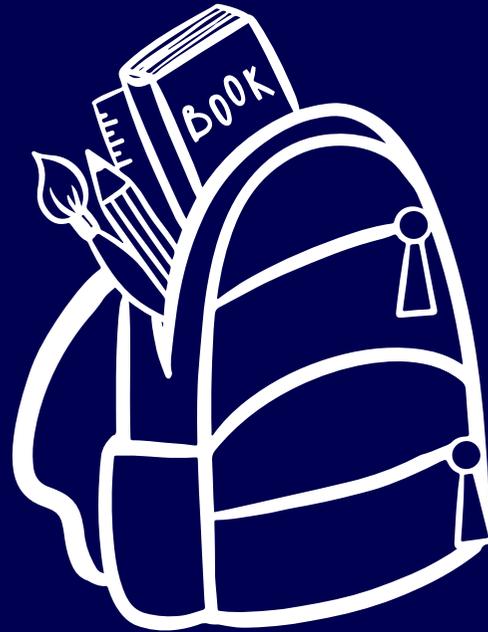

The School Closure Funding Edition

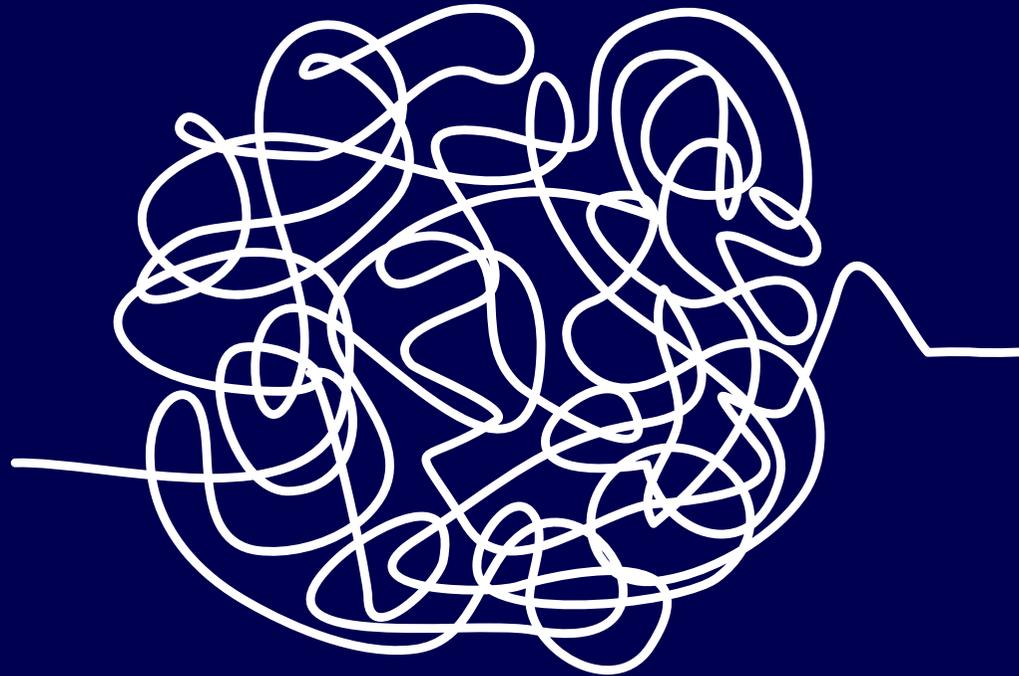




If a school closes and the majority of students (e.g. 100+ students) transfer to a neighboring school district, the new district will NOT receive the standard base aid or transportation funding the first year following the closure.



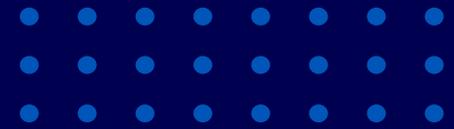
This means the new, receiving school will have to dip into their cash reserves to pay for the transition process.



Unfortunately, there are no controls or guidelines in place to help manage the post-closure transition process.



So receiving schools have to rebalance their budgets and use cash reserves to cover the unplanned influx of students.

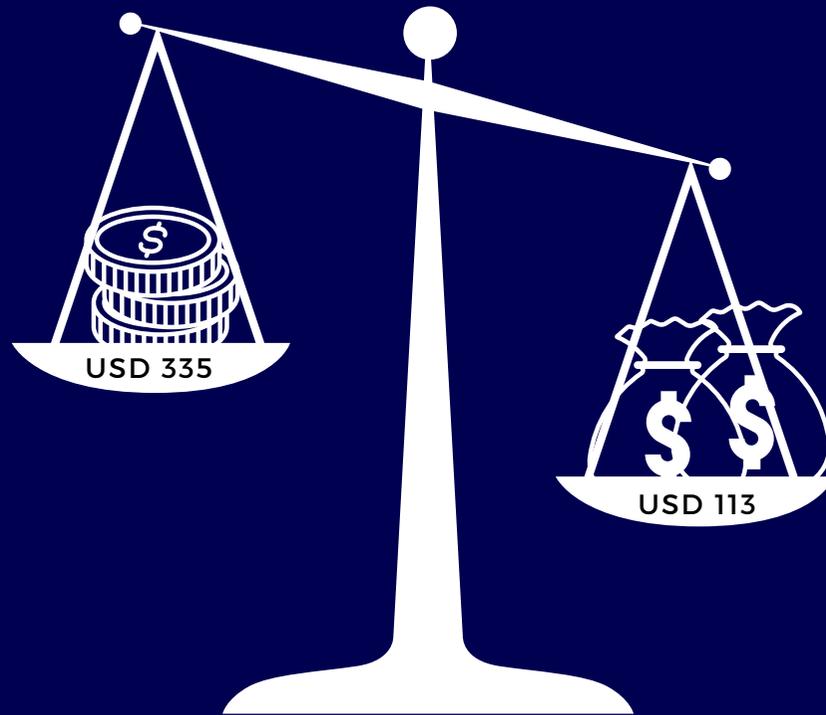

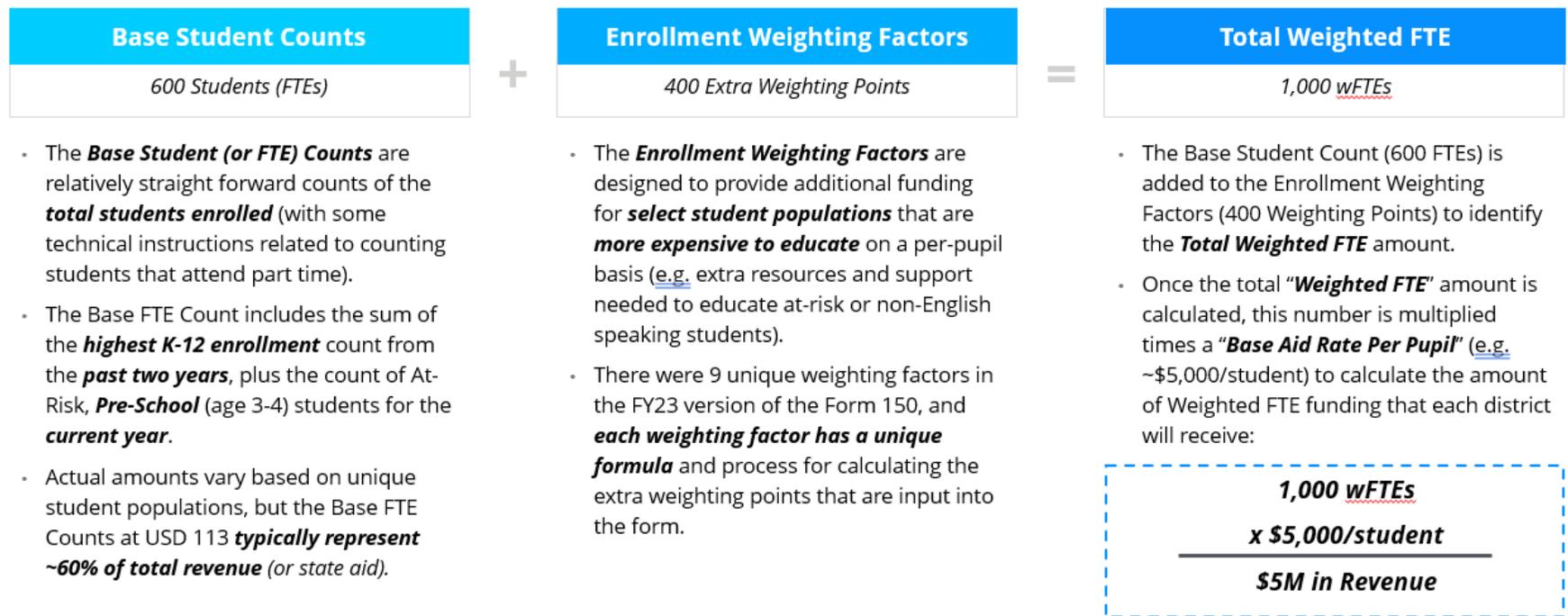

Introduction to KS School Funding Formula

Introduction to the Form 150 and the Kansas School Funding Formula

The Form 150 is a tool used by school administrators to report details related to the district's student population as needed to calculate the total amount of state aid the district will receive.

Illustrative Explanation¹



1) Description of Form 150 process and mechanics simplified to provide general understanding and illustrate the process. Additional factors such as special line items for virtual education and special education are included in the final Form 150 amounts for General Fund and Supplemental Fund revenue. Refer to the KSBOE website and related instruction manuals for detailed information on Form 150 mechanics.

Breakdown of the Form 150 (inputs for funding formula)

USD 335 will be underfunded by ~\$600K if the state (and/or USD 113) does not act. Due to a gap in the school funding formula, USD 335 will not receive the standard base aid per pupil funding for the 100+ students expected to transfer into their district due to the Wetmore school closure.

A

USD 335 **will NOT receive base aid funding** for the 100+ students that transfer to their school due to the closure of Wetmore (\$5,088/student).

USD 335 will be able to claim At-Risk Pre-K students (\$5,088/student).

B

All of the Enrollment Weighting Factors included in section B are based on current year enrollments.

USD 335 **will NOT receive funding for the Transportation Weighting factor** until the land transfer process is complete.

USD 335 will receive funding for all other applicable weighting factors included in this section.

Schools will receive \$5,088/weighting factor, but each weighting factor has a unique formula and process for calculating the extra weighting points so 1 student does NOT equal 1 weighting point). In FY 22, 1 at-risk student equated to ~1/2 of a weighting factor, or \$2,277/student.

C

Assuming 100 students transfer to USD 335, USD 335 will be **underfunded by ~\$600K in the 2023-2024 school year.**

USD 113 will continue receive ~\$800K in "lookback" funding for Wetmore's students over the next two years (~\$1.6M in total).
